Knowledge	<p>Hormonal control and homeostasis in action</p> <p>Describe the structure of the nervous system and the location of the endocrine glands.</p> <p>Understand how the nervous system and Mendel contributed to the theory of evolution.</p> <p>Explain how the work of other scientists contributed to the gene theory.</p> <p>Explain what evidence we now have for the Theory of Evolution.</p> <p>Explain how fossils are formed and why the fossil record will never be completed.</p> <p>Understand how the fossil record is evidence of evolution.</p> <p>Use the complete fossil record of a horse to explain the evolution of this animal as well as applying evolution to the peppered moth.</p> <p>Explain how different scenarios can bring about extinction and how conservation projects can reduce extinction.</p> <p>Understand how antibiotic resistance is developed in bacteria and how this is evidence of evolution.</p> <p>Understand the effects of antibiotic resistance on the treatment of diseases.</p> <p>Describe the process of selective breeding and evaluate its advantages and disadvantages.</p> <p>Explore the ethical and economic considerations for selective breeding.</p> <p>Understand how genetic engineering is carried out and the possible benefits and issues with genetically modified crops.</p> <p>Review animal cloning including embryo transplants and adult cell
